#### **BST** Analysis

Therefore, for all BST: Lower bound: h >= O( lg(n) )

Upper bound:  $h \le O(n)$ 

#### **BST** Analysis

The height of a BST depends on the order in which the data is inserted into it.

ex: 1324576 vs. 4236715

**Q:** How many different ways are there to insert keys into a BST?


**Q:** What is the average height of all the arrangements?



What tree makes you happier?




A tree is height balanced if:





## **BST** Rotation


We will perform a rotation that maintains two properties: **1**.



















## **BST Rotation Summary**

- Four kinds of rotations (L, R, LR, RL)
- All rotations are local (subtrees are not impacted)
- All rotations are constant time: O(1)
- BST property maintained
