

Scientific Notation

In scientific notation, a number can be expressed in the form

$$x = \pm r \times 10^m$$

where *r* is a coefficient in the range $1 \le r < 10$ and *m* is the exponent.

 $1165.7 = 1.1657 \times 10^{3}$ $0.0004728 = 4.728 \times 10^{-4}$

Error in Numerical Methods

- Every result we compute in Numerical Methods contain errors!
- We always have them... so our job? Reduce the impact of the errors
- How can we model the error?

X: true value


$$\hat{X}$$
: approximation
 $e_a = |x - \hat{x}|$
 $e_r = \frac{|x - \hat{x}|}{|x|}$


• Absolute errors can be misleading, depending on the magnitude of the true value *x*.

• Example:

• Relative error is independent of magnitude!

You are tasked with measuring the height of a tree which is known to be exactly 170 ft tall. You later realized that your measurement tools are somewhat faulty, up to a relative error of 10%. What is the maximum measurement for the tree height (numbers rounded to 3 sig figs)?





Significant digits

Significant figures of a number are digits that carry meaningful information. They are digits beginning to the leftmost nonzero digit and ending with the rightmost "correct" digit, including final zeros that are exact.

The number 3.14159 has <u>6</u> significant digits. The number 0.00035 has **Z** significant digits.

The number 0.000350 has <u>3</u> significant digits.

Suppose \boldsymbol{x} is the true value and $\boldsymbol{\tilde{x}}$ the approximation.

The number of significant figures tells us about how many positions of x and \hat{x} agree.

Suppose the true value is


x = 3.141592653

And the approximation is

 $\hat{x} = 3.14$

Let's try the same for:

2) $\hat{x} = 3.14159 \rightarrow \hat{x}$ has 6 sig figs of x 3) $\hat{x} = 3.1415 \rightarrow \hat{x}$ has 4 sig figs of x hung $\hat{x} = 3.1416 \rightarrow \hat{x}$ has 5 sig figs of x



 \hat{x} has *n* **significant figures** of *x* if $|x - \hat{x}|$ has zeros in the first *n* decimal places counting from the leftmost nonzero (leading) digit of *x*, followed by a digit from 0 to 4.

So far, we can observe that $|x - \hat{x}| \le 5 \times 10^{-n}$. Note that the exact number in this example can be written in the scientific notation form x = $q \times 10^{\circ}$. What happens when the exponent is not zero? $\dot{X} = \dot{q} \times$ a × 10 | $e_a = |x - \hat{x}| = |q - \hat{q}| |x|0$ We use the relative error definition instead!

Accurate to *n* significant digits means that you can trust a total of *n* digits. *Accurate digits* is a measure of relative error.


n is the number of accurate significant digits

Relative error:
$$error = \frac{|x_{exact} - x_{approx}|}{|x_{exact}|} \le 5 \times 10^{-n}$$

In general, we will use the rule-of-thumb:

$$error = \frac{|x_{exact} - x_{approx}|}{|x_{exact}|} \le 10^{-n+1}$$

For example, if relative error is 10^{-2} then \hat{x} has at most ______ significant figures of x



Sources of Error

Main source of errors in numerical computation:

- **Rounding error:** occurs when digits in a decimal point (1/3 = 0.3333...) are lost (0.3333) due to a limit on the memory available for storing one numerical value.
- **Truncation error:** occurs when discrete values are used to approximate a mathematical expression (eg. the approximation $\sin(\theta) \approx \theta$ for small angles θ)






Complexity: Matrix-matrix multiplication


For a matrix with dimensions $n \times n$, the computational complexity can be represented by a power function:




We could count the total number of operations to determine the value of the constants above, but instead, we will get an estimate using a numerical experiment where we perform several matrix-matrix multiplications for vary matrix sizes, and store the time to take to perform the operation. 




Demo: Cost of Matrix-Matrix Multiplication



Big-Oh notation





Let f and g be two functions. Then

$$f(x) = O(g(x))$$
 as $x \to \infty$

If an only if there is a positive constant M such that for all sufficiently large values of x, the absolute value of f(x) is at most multiplied by the absolute value of g(x). In other words, there exists a value M and some x_0 such that:

$$|f(x)| \leq M|g(x)| \quad \forall x \geq x_0$$





Big-Oh notation (continue)

Let f and g be two functions. Then

$$f(x) = O(g(x))$$
 as $x \to a$

If an only if there exists a value M and some δ such that:

 $|f(x)| \le M |g(x)| \quad \forall x \text{ where } 0 < |x-a| < \delta$


